Dear Partners in Ministry in the South-Central Synod of Wisconsin,



I am writing to inform you that I will be ending my service as the bishop of our synod next June, a year earlier than my full term.

As most of you know, on May 12, 2017, I suffered a heart attack. I was treated quickly with a coronary stent, and have received good medical care, effective medication and successfully completed cardiac rehab. What most of you do not know is at the same time I was diagnosed with thyroid cancer. The type of cancer I have is not aggressive, is contained, and easily treatable by removing the thyroid. The problem is that since I am on blood thinners for the coronary stent, I am unable to have my thyroid removed at this time. My doctors are monitoring the situation and everything is stable. They are not concerned. This really is not a big deal compared to what so many live with. I am doing well and feeling more fit and healthy than I have in years.

Nonetheless, these health scares have caused John and me to think about what is of ultimate importance in our lives and make decisions about how best to live fully and faithfully into the future. We have decided that it is time for us to move closer to home and family – including my parents and our grandchildren. To that end, we will be seeking our next calls in the Twin Cities.

This means our synod will be electing a new bishop at our next synod assembly, May 5-6, 2018. The synod council will be reviewing the Bishop's election process and assembling election and transition teams. More information will be shared with you as details are worked out.

This also means it is time for each of you to begin to identify potential candidates for the Office of Bishop. Talk with each other, ask questions, seek out gifted pastors, and pray. I will always be available to answer questions about the role and responsibilities of a bishop, but I cannot and will not bring opinions about who should serve in that role.

Serving as your bishop has been one of the greatest honors and privileges of my ministry and I thank you for your call and trust. I have been blessed to share times of celebration and struggle with so many of you. I will miss gathering with you at synod events and in your congregations on Sunday mornings. You have touched my heart, fed my spirit, and given me hope as you live out your faith in Jesus. John joins me in expressing deep gratitude for your welcome, friendship, support and partnership in this good gospel work.

# The Epiphany of Our Lord

Epiphany is observed annually on January 6.

It is an important word for liturgical

churches. The word epiphany comes from the Greek word "epiphaneia," which means "appearance or manifestation." It refers to the wise men, who were the first Gentiles to see the manifestation of God's appearance in the baby Jesus. The day is filled with surprises, mysterious visitors, and exotic gifts. God's story leads us through unexpected twists and turns, and the mission of God's people introduces us to faith partners we have never expected.

In the early church, January 6 was a day for baptism. The central significance of Epiphany is that Christ came as the Light of the World, not just for the Jews but for Gentiles as well. Christ's light is for all.



# The Baptism of Our Lord

Jesus was baptized by John the Baptist in the Jordan river.

When all the people were baptized, and when Jesus also had been baptized and was praying, the heaven was opened, and the Holy Spirit descended upon him in bodily form like a dove. And a voice came from

heaven, "You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased." (Luke 3:21-23)

Baptism is the beginning of a new story. It was for Jesus; it is for us. God claims us as sons and daughters, fills us with the Holy Spirit, and promises to travel the path with us -- a path that will lead us home.

## The Season After The Epiphany

The Epiphany of Our Lord brings the twelve days of Christmas to an end and begins a season that will focus on God's revelation in Jesus.

The Epiphany season is the time when Christ's lordship over all creation is revealed, made manifest, unveiled. What was once known only to the Holy Family and shepherds at Christmas, now is made known to a greater audience.

Jesus is "revealed" as "Son of God" to the Magi, court astrologers from distant lands who come to worship and give this King their tribute. Jesus' epiphany as Son of God reaches to the ends of the earth.

Jesus is "revealed" as Son of God to John the Baptist and his disciples at the river Jordan.

Jesus is "revealed" as Son of God to a growing base of support among the populace of Galilee, and particularly a group of followers, some fishermen, even a tax collector.

Jesus' epiphany as Son of God reaches even across time, as the Church, gathered each Lord's Day around Word and Sacrament, is embraced by the call to "come and see, come and follow, go and tell others." The Epiphany season lasts as long as it takes to move us from January 6 to Ash Wednesday, which is February 14 this year.



### Three questions

There's a tale of a traveling priest who was confronted by a soldier in pre-revolutionary Russia. Rifle in hand, the soldier barked, "Who are you? Where are you going? Why are you going there?"
